


Lee Payne with his best buck of the 2016 rut, 212 2/8 DS



My 2016 Fallow Rut

All the signs pointed toward a great 2016 fallow/red rut in our hunting areas. As late spring and summer came around, the velvet stags started to show up. At this early stage four stags stood out in the ones we were seeing. Hopefully they would be around when the rut was in full swing. Unfortunately, as early March came around, conditions had dried off significantly and the only cover we

were going to have were saffron thistles.

After taking a couple of smaller stags I focused my efforts on getting a mature stag. Over the course of March and April we had manage to see a number of mature stage worth pursuing, one menial stag in particular had my undivided attention.



After many failed attempts due to roos, other deer and lack of cover I was beginning to think it wasn't going to happen. After bumping him around the side of the hill once again I had just about had enough. As I stood there in frustration thinking about my next move, the sound of heavy antler clashing together made up my mind. I quickly headed in the direction of the fighting around the side of the hill as the heavy clashing continued.

I made good ground quickly. Moments later the fighting stopped. I stood among the sparse box trees trying to get a visual on the stags. Seconds later the menial stag I had been chasing appeared above me. With no cover I wasn't able to move. I kept track of his position as I crouch next to the big box tree and as he made his way towards toward my position I could feel my adrenalin start to stir. Now behind a fallen log I knocked an drew with minimal arrow and movement and waited. With the thermals now lifting the wind was in my back knowing I didn't have long before he caught my scent something had to happen fast. As the stag appeared from behind the log I placed the pin on his chest. He stopped out at just over 20 meters. Abruptly lifting his head I knew it was now or never. As the shot went off I knew it was far from perfect.

The open grass paddocks allowed me to follow from a distance coming up over a rise he caught my movement and jumped the fence and made it over a bench out of sight. Peering over the rise I watch the stag from a distance making his way into a small gully where he bedded down. Know it was better to give him some time. I watch from a distance. 30 minutes later I was holding one of my biggest fallow to date.



A few days later, luck was on my side again I was able to take another exceptional fallow buck. A lengthy stalk and perfectly placed shot sealed the deal on a real old stag. With coronets almost on his skull and good mass he was great way to finish another great deer season and the end of the 2016 rut

Being an introvert and not really that keen on crowds I garnered some 'good oil' about likely but less popular spots.

Be interesting to see how the plan to control them plays out, the deer get clobbered and they don't cause nearly as much damage brumbies. The the real as mongol/mongrel lookina ponies certainly look the part, odd how the occasional race horse looking model seems to creep in, the colt from Old Regret maybe?





